


The economic profile of the city of Riga 2024

Why Invest in Riga?



Access to Wide Markets

Riga is the largest metropolis in the Baltic States, and it is one of the largest cities in Northern Europe, taking into account its surrounding areas. Six million people live around Riga within a 3-hour drive, but 20 million people can be reached in a 12-hour drive.



Developed Business Infrastructure

Riga Airport offers direct flights to more than 100 destinations in Europe, Asia, Africa, and America. As a multimodal transport hub, the Port of Riga provides connections with ports in 50 countries around the world. In addition, the future high-speed railway line Rail Baltica will provide fast cargo transit between the Port of Riga, the capitals of the Baltic States and several European destinations, including the North Sea and the Adriatic Sea.



Qualified Workforce

Almost 40 % of Riga residents have higher education, while a fifth have secondary or higher professional education. In addition, most of the population speaks three languages, including Latvian, Russian, and English.



Quality Living Environment

Low cost of living, low noise level, convenient and accessible public transport, clean city, low crime rate, and mild climate. Many green areas with opportunities for walking, cycling and water recreation.



Global Openness and International Integration

Latvia is a member of the European Union and the Eurozone, which ensures free movement of goods, services, capital and labor. Latvia is also a full member of all the world's largest economic and political organizations, including the North Atlantic Treaty Alliance (NATO), the World Trade Organization (WTO), and the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD).



Accessibility

Riga is the capital of the Republic of Latvia, located at the center of the Baltic States region. It is the largest city in the Baltics and one of the largest in the entire Baltic Sea region. With direct flights to over 100 destinations available from its airport, Riga is well-connected to the world. Its port also links with 50 countries around the globe, making it an ideal gateway to Europe. Additionally, with the upcoming Rail Baltica infrastructure project, Riga and the Baltic region will be fully integrated into the European railway network

Riga International Airport

Riga Airport is a fast-growing air hub in Northern Europe, providing a vital link between the Baltic States and some of Europe's top business centers and leisure destinations. Port of Riga

As the center of the Baltic States, the Port of Riga offers excellent access to the markets of Northern Europe. With the ability to deliver goods anywhere in the Baltic States, as well as to Stockholm, Helsinki, and Warsaw within 24 hours and to all of Scandinavia within 48 hours, Riga is an ideal location for logistics and distribution. Its special economic zone regime provides significant tax incentives and favorable rules for the movement and storage of goods.

New passenger terminal - **Riga Ro-Pax** is expected to be completed by 2026. This facility will boast three berths, each with a total length of 620 meters and a maximum draft depth of 10.5 meters.

Rail Baltica

Rail Baltica is an ambitious infrastructure project that seeks to integrate the Baltic states into the European railway network. Involving five European Union countries – **Poland, Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia** and indirectly **Finland** - the project promises to bring about significant benefits for the transport and logistics industry. The Rail Baltica railway line, connecting major cities such as **Helsinki, Tallinn, Pärnu, Riga, Panevezys, Kaunas, Vilnius, and Warsaw**, is expected to increase the capacity and speed of railway transport, reducing journey times for passengers. The new network is estimated to handle at least **13 million tons of cargo per year**, opening new trade opportunities with EU countries and potentially connecting the transport corridor with Eurasian countries in the future. This ambitious infrastructure project is considered the largest in the Baltic region in the last 100 years. It is expected to serve **at least 5 million passengers annually**, providing them with modern and efficient travel experience.






Riga is the largest city in the Baltic States in terms of population. With 32 % population concentration in the capital, Riga has one of the highest indicators in the European Union.

Characteristics of the Population






Education and Employment


The city's economy is strong, with a low unemployment rate of only 4.2 % and a well-educated population.



39.2 % of the residents of Riga have obtained higher education, while 20 % hold higher or secondary professional education degrees. The city's multiculturalism is reflected in its citizens' multilingualism, with over half of the population speaking at least two foreign languages.

Education and
Science

Riga is the educational center of Latvia. The city is home to 101 secondary schools, 148 preschools, and 36 universities and colleges, with over 150,000 students. In addition, almost half of all vocational schools in Latvia are in Riga and its surroundings.

Knowledge Mile

The goal is to create a comprehensive innovation infrastructure by 2030 in Pārdaugava. This project will promote synergistic relations between science and business, providing growth opportunities for Riga and Latvia. This potential will be further enhanced by the integration of the Rail Baltica railway line through Torņakalns, transforming the area into a sprawling campus with an estimated size of 4-5 square kilometers and the capacity to educate 30,000 to 40,000 students, the largest in the Baltic States.

As the economic and financial center of Latvia, Riga provides half of the country's GDP and exports. Its full membership in the world's leading economic and political organizations provides a safe environment for foreign investment backed by broad support.

Latvia is a **full member** of many respectable international organizations.



Riga – Emerging Startup Hub

Riga has emerged as a startup hub with many opportunities for testing ideas, developing businesses, and networking activities. Latvia was the first of the Baltic States to adopt a special Startup law, which provides support for such companies, including special tax rates and a support program for attracting highly qualified workers.




Availability of office space

Class A office vacancy rate





Proportion of vacant retail spaces in shopping centers





Living Environment

Climate

The climate of Riga is formed by moderate latitude air masses coming from the Atlantic Ocean, which create dynamic cyclonic conditions. The summer months in Riga are moderately warm, the average temperature does not exceed 20 °C, while the winter months are also relatively mild, with the average temperature not falling below 0 °C.

Riga earns its reputation as one of Europe's greenest capitals, boasting expansive green spaces. Despite its generally flat terrain, the city features several hills, with the highest being Dzegužkalns, rising 26 meters above sea level.

Green Area and Waters

Riga's green areas include 29 parks, 10 large forest areas, forest parks, 66 squares, and 24 cemeteries. The city is bisected by Latvia's largest river, the Daugava, along with several smaller rivers. There are nine lakes and ponds within Riga's borders. There are also nine official swimming spots in the city, one of which is Vakarbulji beach, which has the blue flag status.

Bicycle Transport

Currently, the bicycle infrastructure network in Riga covers 119 kilometers, and it is planned to expand it to 300 kilometers by 2030. 40 % of Riga residents use a bicycle for transportation, 10 % ride a bicycle every day and 17 % – at least once a week. In addition, the city has seen an increase in the activity of suppliers of electric scooters and bicycles in recent years.

Riga is renowned for its dynamic and vibrant cultural scene, with a diverse range of popular places such as **the Latvian National Art Museum, Kalnciema Quarter, Āgenskalns Market, The National Library of Latvia, Dailes Theater, and Tallinas Street Quarter**. The city's Old Town is recognized as a UNESCO World Cultural and Natural Heritage Site, while Riga's status as an architectural gem is evident in its array of historic and contemporary structures. Visitors to Riga can admire various buildings, including churches from the city's beginnings, medieval buildings in the old town, unique examples of Art Nouveau and preserved wooden architecture from centuries ago. It should be noted that approximately 40 % of all buildings in the center of Riga are in Art Nouveau style and this proportion exceeds many other European cities.

Pride

Riga is a modern metropolis with a wealth of historical treasures, attracting visitors with its diverse cultural offerings, gastronomic delights, stunning architecture, and proximity to nature's wonders. It is the most cosmopolitan of all the capitals in the Baltic region.

Old Town – UNESCO World Heritage

Old Riga, the oldest part of the city of Riga, serves as its central hub and is a favored destination for tourists seeking leisure and entertainment. **In 1997, the historical center of Riga was recognized and added to the UNESCO World Heritage List.** Old Riga boasts diverse architectural styles, with many buildings holding the status of cultural monuments. Visitors can admire examples of Romanesque and Gothic architecture, buildings from the Baroque era, as well as classicism and modernism. Notable landmarks in Old Riga include the Riga Dome Cathedral and St. Peter's Church, the latter offering breathtaking views of the city from its 72-meter-high tower.

Riga Central Market

Many cities around the world have lost or rebuilt their central market squares, leading tour guides to often lament the absence of a market in various European metropolises. However, Riga stands apart in this regard, as the impressive Riga Central Market still proudly occupies the heart of the city.

What makes Riga's market truly unique are its pavilions, which were originally constructed in Kurzeme, Vaiņode, as hangars for German army airships, known as zeppelins. When the Riga Central Market was officially opened in 1930, it not only

became the largest but also garnered recognition as the best and most modern market in Europe. Despite facing challenges throughout its history, the Riga Central Market has retained its significance and flourished. Today, it serves as a vibrant gathering place for people from all walks of life. Located in the heart of Riga, it is widely regarded as the most colorful and dynamic area of the city, offering a wide variety of goods, particularly fresh, tasty, and diverse products sourced from the Latvian countryside.

World Class Belly Delights

In the city center, culinary delights await at every corner. Riga's dining scene offers a fusion of local and international cuisine, with an emphasis on seasonal and locally sourced ingredients. Whether you prefer an elegant restaurant with white tablecloths or a cozy spot for coffee and a vegan bun, one thing is clear: Riga is a city that truly appreciates good food. In 2023, the prestigious MICHELIN guide unveiled its newest gourmet destinations in Latvia, recommending 26 restaurants. Among them, 19 are located in Riga. Notable mentions include one one-star restaurant, Max Cekot Kitchen, and three Bib Gourmand restaurants: Milda, Shōyu, and Snatch.

Wooden Architecture

Riga's architectural landscape is distinguished by its charming wooden buildings, a rarity in modern Europe. These delightful structures can be found in neighborhoods such as Pārdaugava and Grīziņkalns. One notable example is the Kalnciema Quarter, showcasing remarkable 19th-century wooden heritage. A dedicated group is actively working to preserve

the historic essence of the neighborhood while incorporating modern elements of the 21st century. These houses blend Latvian and European design elements, and their courtyards serve as venues for various fairs, art exhibitions, and creative workshops, offering visitors a chance to immerse themselves in the area's rich cultural heritage.

Art Nouveau

Vienna, Brussels, or Barcelona may claim to be the capital of Art Nouveau, but the true epicenter of this ornate style lies in Riga. In the city center, approximately one-third of the houses are stunning examples of Art Nouveau. This decorative style, which flourished from the late 19th to early 20th centuries, reached its zenith in Riga during a period of unprecedented prosperity.

The epitome of Riga's Art Nouveau style can be found along Alberta Street. Each house here is a unique representation of 20th-century architectural prowess, with eight of them recognized as nationally significant architectural monuments.

For those looking to delve deeper into this era, the Art Nouveau Museum on Alberta Street provides a comprehensive look into the interiors and lifestyles of the time, in addition to showcasing the impressive facades of the buildings themselves.

National Library of Latvia

Located on the left bank of the Daugava River, across from Old Riga, is the National Library of Latvia, fondly called the Castle of Light. This monumental cultural landmark is one of modern Latvia's most ambitious building projects, designed by renowned architect





Gunārs Birkerts and opened in August 2014.

Today, the library serves as a modern information and cultural hub for local and international visitors alike. It features thematic reading rooms with impressive bookshelves, periodicals, audio and video recordings, and a collection of rare books from both Latvian and foreign sources. With over 4 million items, the library's collection focuses on printed materials related to Latvia and Latvians.

Closeness to Nature

Riga's abundant green spaces offer visitors the chance to enjoy fresh air, picnics, romantic walks, or runs year-round. City parks, whether snow-covered or adorned with autumn colors, are attractive destinations with complimentary WiFi available. For a closer connection to nature, Riga is just a 30-minute drive from beaches and surrounded by forests. Walking along the pier provides refreshing sea breezes and stunning views, with all major natural attractions within easy reach.

Thriving Cultural and Artistic Environment

Riga's cultural scene is vibrant, with theaters, art galleries, and outdoor events. The city boasts a luxurious Opera House, music venues, independent cinemas, museums, and contemporary art spaces. Contemporary art thrives in Riga, with pop-up galleries revitalizing Soviet-era industrial buildings and small independent galleries scattered throughout the city. The International Biennale of Contemporary Art RIBOCA and the National Art Museum highlight Riga's commitment to modern art and architectural excellence.

Young and Stylish

Although Riga has a remarkable age of 820 years, it is still youthful and dynamic. One can experience the city's lively spirit by attending one of the many street food festivals or creative urban events that occur throughout the year. Riga is also home to some of the best coffee roasters in the Baltics, making it easy to find a great cup of coffee. The same goes for a glass of great beer – local breweries take their craft seriously.



Events with International Resonance

Riga is a hub for large-scale events, with a vibrant calendar year-round. In 2024, the city will welcome beloved artists and top-tier performers, offering a diverse range of musical experiences. Local musicians are also preparing for significant events and concert tours. Highlights of the city's event lineup include the Rimi Riga Marathon, Night of Museums, Riga Opera Festival, Jazz Festival "Riga Rhythms," Positivus Music Festival, and the FIA World Rally Championship stage "Tet Rally Latvia." Concert-goers can anticipate performances by Ville Valo, hip-hop icon GZA, and the acclaimed band Snarky Puppy.

Future

Rail Baltica

Rail Baltica is the largest infrastructure initiative in the Baltic region in the last 100 years and aims to integrate the Baltic States into the European railway network.

The project involves constructing a new railway line to European standard width (1435mm) across five EU countries: Poland, Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, and Finland.

Once completed, it will link 8 major cities, including Helsinki, Tallinn, Pärnu, Riga, Panevezys, Kaunas, Vilnius, and Warsaw, covering a total distance of 870 km, with 265 km passing through Latvia.

Rail Baltica will gradually start operating in 2028-2030, providing fast train connections between Baltic capitals every two hours.

Expected outcomes include creating 36,000 new jobs and enabling maximum speeds of 249 km/h for passenger transportation and 120 km/h for cargo.

The project is estimated to cost 5.8 billion euros.

The Eastern Highway

The Eastern Highway represents a significant infrastructure endeavor aimed at establishing an urban loop to facilitate traffic flow between suburbs and neighborhoods, alleviating congestion in Riga's city center. Stretching from the South Bridge complex to Viestura Prospect, the highway's missing section between Ieriķu Street and Vietalvas Street was completed in 2023. This project, costing a total of 37.8 million euros, stands as one of Riga's most ambitious traffic infrastructure initiatives in recent years.



Preses Nama Kvartāls

The development of a new business center in Riga, centered around the historic Preses Nams building, is poised to shape the city's future significantly. Comprising a modern, sustainable business hub alongside a versatile recreational, sports, entertainment, and cultural complex, as well as a hotel and various public spaces, the project aims to establish itself as Riga's new central business district.

At the heart of the complex will stand an impressive 11-story, 120-meter-long, and 50-meter-high glazed building, offering 24/7 Class A offices. Designed to meet BREEM Excellent and nZEB standards, it will accommodate 2,500 workspaces. The multifunctional center's ground floor will provide 7,500 m² of commercial space for lease, while its rooftop will boast a unique feature in the Baltics: a multifunctional sports area featuring the region's first rooftop football field. Additionally, amenities such as treadmills, fitness centers, a 300-seat dining area, and shopping outlets will be available to employees and visitors.

Amidst this bustling metacity, the historic 22-story Preses Nams building, once a symbol of press freedom in the late 1980s and early 1990s, will undergo a complete renovation. Transformed into a four-star, 305-room Holiday Inn hotel, it will preserve its significant historical legacy. Guests can enjoy breathtaking panoramic views of the Daugava River and Old Riga while enjoying dining options at restaurants and cafes. Conveniently situated just 8 km from Riga International Airport, the hotel will offer an ideal location for both business and leisure travelers alike.



Knowledge Mile

It is an infrastructure of innovation and science, which is being built in Pārdaugava between the universities located on the left bank of the Daugava. It will be a new dynamic space for the growth of science, education, business and the real estate market.

VEF District

The territory of VEF has long been the cradle of technological innovations and the main driving force of the economy. During the last century, it has become the epicenter of the Latvian technology industry, where the leading technology companies of the 21st century are located.

In recent years, technology companies, real estate developers and VEF Culture Palace have converged in the vicinity of VEF, resulting in the innovation movement VEFRESH. The aim of this initiative is

to revitalize the VEF district and its surroundings, transforming it into a smart city innovation hub. The aim is to create a modern, socially dynamic area where a wide range of cultural, innovative and educational events take place.

VEFRESH boasts the highest concentration of ICT professionals in the country, accounting for approximately 43 % of all ICT exports. The movement brings together both local and international companies, such as Accenture and Latvia's largest mobile operator LMT, as well as the city of Riga. Together, they strive to establish VEF and the Teika district as thriving centers of business, housing and culture.

Skante

Skante is rapidly emerging as Riga's newest hub for both business and residential living. The neighborhood already boasts three modern residential complexes – Skantes Peaks, Skantes Houses, and Skantes Park – alongside several fully occupied office buildings such as Skantes City, Place Eleven, Rietumu Banka, and Luminor.

Moreover, three new Class A office complexes have recently been completed, including the first phase of VERDE, recognized as Riga's greenest office complex, the inaugural New Hanza office building, and the Elemental Business Centre. Additionally, plans are underway for the Sporta 2 block.

The start of construction of modern, high-quality New Hanza apartments is planned, as well as the residential project "Arena Garden Towers" near Merks



House, which is located next to the future Riga park "Skanstes Dārzi".

By the end of 2024, the Riga Municipality is set to finalize the establishment of a substantial public park in Skanste, incorporating innovative rainwater collection channels and ponds, alongside the creation of new streets, recreational areas, and walking spaces.

RIX Airport City

RIX Airport City is an upcoming, multifunctional hub adjacent to Riga Airport. With its 24-hour operations, competitive labor costs, and the widest network of destinations in the region, RIX Airport City is poised to become the business center of the Baltic and Northern Europe.

Strategically located next to the high-speed railway Rail Baltica, which will connect the Baltic capitals to the railway networks in Finland, Poland, and Germany, RIX is on track to become the latest generation Northern European air transport and railway center. The Rail Baltica station will be connected to the new, modern passenger terminal, scheduled for completion in 2028 and capable of accommodating up to 12 million passengers per year.

RIX Airport City is designed to be the most well-connected business center in the Baltics, comprising

an airport hotel, offices, and retail spaces, along with a variety of services for passengers, cargo handlers, and local residents, covering a 24-hectare area. Aviation-related industries will be given priority, including cargo transportation and logistics, e-commerce, IT and electronics, tourism, and pharmaceuticals.

The first phase of the project, scheduled for completion in 2028, will include a five-star hotel with direct access to the terminal and Class A office buildings.

Granīta Street / Šķīrotava

In the sustainable development strategy of Riga until 2030, Granīta Street is designated as a priority area for the expansion of resource-intensive industries. These include industries that require significant electrical capacity, extensive water resources, and vast land areas; which are particularly dependent on high-volume deliveries and need easy access without crossing the city centre.

The planned transformation of Granīta Street into a new production space provides huge potential for various industries, contributing to the emergence of a high-quality production cluster. Leading companies such as Grindeks, Forevers, Kalceks, Schneider Electric, DB Schenker and Groglass have already established their presence in this location, with ambitious expansion plans in the near future. For example, Grindeks plans to build and use a 3 ha area – the former Šķīrotava prison.





Magdelēnas Kvartāls

Located in the quiet center of Riga between Antonijas, E. Melngaiļa and Strēlnieku streets. The neighborhood of the quarter is included in the UNESCO World Heritage List.

Since 2018, the project has won several excellence awards, consolidating its landmark status in the Riga embassy district.

The second phase of construction has started, where two A-class office buildings with an area of 9,500 m² and 1,200 m² will be located, respectively.

The project has been carefully designed to achieve LEED Platinum certification and meet nZEB standards.

Magdelēna kvartāls will include 300 apartments, more than 20,000 m² of commercial space and office space.

Satekles Business Center

In a strategically advantageous location next to the Riga Central railway station and the future Rail Baltica station.

The A-class office complex, consisting of five interconnected buildings, occupies 12,000 m².

During the design phase, the project received the prestigious BREEAM certificate "Outstanding", marking it as the first and only building in Latvia that received the highest rating.

Scheduled to open in 2025.

Developed by Linstow Baltic.

Kimmel kvartāls

Between Bruninieku, Krišjāņa Valdemāra, Stabu, and Skolas streets.

Swedish real estate developer Eastnine.

Designed as a multi-faceted complex that includes offices, retail outlets, service facilities and a convenient gathering place in the heart of the city.

The project is planned to be developed in two phases, with the first phase expected to be completed by 2024, followed by the entire complex in 2026-2027.

The Pine

The first wooden office building of this scale in the Baltics.

It is planned to be completed in 2026-2027.

Developed by the Swedish real estate company Eastnine.

Designed as a Class A office structure that meets WELL and LEED standards.

The total area is 16,900 m².
